Dear parents & caregivers,

We have reached the end of a busy and productive term, as well as the end of Semester one of the 2022 school year. While it has been a year full of challenges there is also much to celebrate about our wonderful community, and I continue to be energised by my interactions with staff, children and families. Let's hope term 3 continues in this vein!

Since I last wrote to you, a number of students and staff have shone in their various pursuits. Last week, our year 6 band, under the expert tutelage of Music teacher Olivia Bozzon, competed in the Nazareth College battle of the Bands. While we ultimately didn't win the competition, we were competing against larger Secondary schools, and our students really shone, doing St Francis and their families proud. Music is such an important part of our lives and it is indeed heart-warming to see our students involved in initiatives such as these-my congratulations to all involved.

Recently, I have been advised that year 6 students Miriam Fisher and Aria De Pasquale have been selected in the *State* SAPSASA Football and Hockey teams respectively. This is a huge achievement for both girls, as these teams are selected from state wide talent from all schools in SA. Last weekend, our year 4 students completed their initiation into full communion with the Catholic Church by receiving their first Holy Communion. There were services on Saturday night, and two on Sunday. Each of these services were wonderful celebrations of this important milestone in our young people's faith journey. My thanks to Angela DeNadai, our year 4 staff, Fr Michael Trainor our Parish priest and Joan Walsh, Pastoral associate for their work in preparing the students and the services.

This week, we celebrated and acknowledged NAIDOC week in a variety of ways. Classes have been learning about this significance of this celebration, and our year 5 students led a beautiful Mass on Wednesday. This was also 'donut day' at school, and while enjoying tasty donuts supplied by Charmaine Norris from Scrummy's Cakes, we raised over \$400 for the Tjindu Foundation, which supports young Aboriginal people through education, cultural programs and sports programs. Well done to the year 5 students for this worthy initiative!

Families would have hopefully seen the media coverage recently surrounding school fees in Catholic Schools for 2023. We are pleased to inform our school families that there will be no increase in school fees for the 2023 school year. As South Australians continue to feel the impact of COVID-19, Catholic Education SA has announced it will freeze fees at its 86 Diocesan schools for the 2023 school year.

"These decisions are part of our continued COVID 19 response as we seek to support families at a time when they are being impacted by rising costs and inflation," says Dr Neil McGoran, Director, Catholic Education SA. Since 2019, Catholic Education SA has been

implementing the *Making Catholic Education More Affordable Initiative* to ensure our schools are accessible to any family who wants their child to have a Catholic education.

Dr Neil McGoran said the fee-freeze would not impact the quality of education. "We're committed to keeping school fees as low as possible and ensuring a Catholic education is affordable and accessible to all."

As previously advised, Semester one reports will be distributed on Thursday, which is the last day of term 3 for all students. These reports reflect progress towards achievement of the year level standards and are important moments in time, as we all reset our learning goals for Semester two.

On behalf of the staff at St Francis, I wish all families a safe and restful holiday period and we look forward to seeing you all in term three.

Pope Francis' thoughts on First Holy Communion

This Sunday's Gospel

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C 10 July 2022

Luke 10:25-37 - The Good Samaritan

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, God gives us a very simple guideline to find true happiness: live by the law of love. In the Gospel, Jesus showed how that law was lived out by the Samaritan who helped the injured man. The people who passed him by were following rules too, but it was not God's rule.

In his own life, Jesus always lived by the rule of love. He always looked for what would heal, comfort, encourage or help. Talk with your children about the small ways they can apply the rule of love at home, in the neighbourhood, and at school. Share with them some instances when you chose to follow the law of love.

Playberry Tier 3 Intervention

This year, as well as introducing a new way of teaching reading and spelling, we have also introduced a Tier 3 Intervention program at St Francis School. First let me start by reminding you about the Tiers of Intervention.

The 3 Tiers approach is about identifying and accommodating students on their learning journey. The approach includes 3 tiers:

Tier 1 – **Core classroom instruction**. This includes teaching to the science, with revision activities, explicit teaching of new concepts and daily practice of skills taught.

Tier 2 – **Targeted small group instruction**. This is where our teachers or amazing ESO's take small groups that are identified by the teacher as needing extra practice or learning of particular skills taught in class. Examples of this Tier include focused work on alphabet



recognition, handwriting practice, phonological awareness practice, re-teaching of spelling skills or concepts or reading practice.



Tier 3 – Intensive individual or paired intervention. In this Tier, we have a highly skilled teacher, Mrs Sarah Battistella, working with pairs of students using the Playberry program. Playberry is a multisensory literacy program



designed for students that have not made adequate progress after receiving good quality Tier 1 and 2 teaching. Playberry follows a carefully designed synthetic phonics structure that methodically adds to existing knowledge to build word attack and spelling skills. Sarah works with pairs of students each week for an hour and they then take home reading cards and practice passages to revise at home during the week.



Students may work in more than one Tier of Intervention at any one time. Some of our Early Years students engage daily in Tier 1 – whole class literacy lessons, as well as working in small targeted groups with their teacher or ESO on a particular need (Tier 2) and then also work with Sarah once per week.



Our Playberry room is located under the stairs in the room attached to the Playgroup / Transition Reception room. You will see it immediately when walking past as it is the one with the Spelling Rules poster on the window!


