
Morphology

Do you know what morphology means? Did you know that our students are learning morphology from Reception all the way to Year 6?

Morphology is the study of words and their parts. Morphemes, like prefixes, suffixes and base words, are defined as the smallest meaningful units of meaning in a word. Morphemes are important for phonics in both reading and spelling, as well as in vocabulary and comprehension.

But why should you as parents know a bit about morphology? Inevitably, you will be asked questions from your children such as, "Why does bicycle mean two wheels but biology doesn't mean two –ologies? The answer is because the prefix in biology is not bi– (two), it is bio– (life). By the way, -ology means the study of something.

We have a whole school morphology scope and sequence that informs us what we need to teach and when. In Reception, students learn what a suffix is and are introduced to suffix 's' and suffix 'ed'. From there, each year, our students are introduced and taught the meanings and functions of different morphemes including prefixes, suffixes, roots and bases.




One resource that is used to aid the teaching of morphology, is the Word Cracker. As you can see, the first part of the Cracker is for prefixes, the middle is for roots or bases, and the end of the Cracker is for suffixes. The word on this poster 'deconstructing' is meaningful because that is what we are doing when we are looking at words through the eyes of morphology.

de (down / reversal) con (with or together) struct (to build) ing (present tense)



Therefore, the meaning of the word 'deconstructing' is to reduce or analyse (something) to its constituent parts in order to reinterpret it.

As well as teaching the meanings of the morphemes in words, we also teach the spelling rules associated with adding affixes (prefixes and suffixes) to bases and roots. In the early years this is as simple as 'just adding suffixes to VVC words'. This means that when we are adding a suffix to a word that has one vowel followed by two consonants, we can just add the suffix straight onto the word, as in **kick** + **s** or **spend** + **ing**. As the words get longer and more suffixes are introduced, the students are taught rules to go with them such as the 'drop e' rule. This rule is for V-C-E words; words that end with a 'silent e'. We teach that we drop the final 'e' when adding a vowel suffix, as in **make** + **ing** = **making**.


